The program is designed as the first step to educate beginning fly tiers to the basic principals needed to begin fly tying. The class begins with learning how to start placing the thread on the hook, adding basic body parts of the fly, adding the hackle, and tying off the fly. The class is the first step to the more advance classes which will include dry flies and nymphs.

Each student will be given the opportunity to make several flies, mainly streamers.

The class is the first in the beginning series that will take the student from basic skills to the most complicated flies and lures.

2- Intermediate-

A second class will deal with more advanced fly tying, such as more complicated streamers, nymphs and wet flies. These flies require more finesse at a higher skill level.
