There is a .25 per item entry fee in these departments. Must accompany entry blank!

All exhibits should be pre-registered by June 30, exhibitors are encouraged to list every entry that they may have available to bring.

Entries for exhibitors 19 and under should be entered in Department XI. Entries received in any other home and garden departments will compete with adult entries.

***Some classes have been divided into "Traditional" and "Vocational" categories. Only persons 20 years of age and older who are enrolled in a vocational / special needs program may enter the "Vocational" category.

Actual items to be exhibited will be accepted ONLY between 9:00 AM and 3:00 PM on Sunday, August 7, 2011.

Fair management reserves the right to refuse to accept any entry deemed by fair management to be in poor taste.

Fair management has the right to open any and all canned good items!

Only one entry per category per exhibitor will be accepted. It is the responsibility of the exhibitor to decide in which category an item will be entered.

Judging for the Home & Garden classes will take place on Monday, August 8. No exhibitors or spectators will be permitted in the hall during the judging.

Any entry not deemed worthy will not be placed. Judges' decisions are final.

"Best of Show" rosettes will be awarded at the discretion of the Judges.

Exhibits will be guarded; every effort will be made to protect them from damage. However, neither the Fair Board nor the management is responsible for accidents, loss or damage.

Fair management may at any time order the removal of any exhibit or part of any exhibit that has become unfit for show.

Exhibits will be removed from the hall only on Sunday, August 14, 2011 between the hours of 1:00 PM and 3:00 PM. No exceptions will be made. Perishable items will be destroyed if not picked up at this time; others will be kept for one week. If you have any questions contact Jeanette.
